

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

Awesome North East Wales



Tranquil North Shropshire

Oswestry nestles into a quiet corner of North Shropshire and it is the ideal starting point to explore Ellesmere and Shropshire's Lake District. Don't miss the award winning Park Hall Countryside Experience (7). It's a fabulous family fun day with everything from pig racing to tractor rides, museums and more. Take a break at the semi-ruined Whittington Castle (8) in the quintessential English village of Whittington. Travel on to the market town of Ellesmere (9) and wander around the picturesque meres or lakes.



Darwin's Shrewsbury and metal mayhem

Darwin's Shrewsbury is another great day out. First stop is the unique British Ironwork Centre (10) with its Spoon Gorilla and metal animal safari. Stunning views over to Wales reward a climb up Nesscliffe Hill (11) and a small detour takes you to the village of Melverley to see the 14th century timber framed church (12). Shrewsbury (13), birthplace of Charles Darwin is Shropshire's county town and a delight of black and white Tudor buildings arranged within a loop of the River Severn.




Majestic Mid Wales

Wander along the Welsh and English border from Oswestry to Welshpool (14) and discover ancient limeworks and the Montgomery canal. Climb to Rodney's Pillar (15) for impressive border landscapes. Visit Powis Castle (16) with its majestic gardens and don't miss a steam train ride on the Welshpool to Llanfair Railway (17). A detour to the quirky along quiet roads as you head to Lake Vyrnwy (18). It's a valkers delight with 11 miles of gentle tracks around the lake

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Ancient beginnings

This is where Oswestry began. Old Oswestry, the 3000 year old hillfort, is considered one of the finest in the country and is known as the Stonehenge of the Iron Age. Legend even has it that King Arthur's Guinevere was born here. Stroll to the top to see views over Shropshire, Powys and Cheshire and the town of Oswestry. It's a wildlife haven and spring brings a carpet of bluebells.



Industrial heritage

From the UNESCO World Heritage Site of Pontcysyllte and Chirk Aqueducts to the hidden canals that wander through these Borderlands, there is a soft echo of The Industrial Revolution in and around Oswestry. Heritage railways remind us of the great days of steam and you can even take a leisurely 'cruise' on a horse drawn



Border castles

Visit fairytale Whittington Castle with its moat and swans or spend a day at Chirk, the impressive Marcher castle that has guarded the borders since medieval times. National Trust Erddig House is a fascinating mix of upstairs/downstairs living and Powis Castle and gardens at Welshpool are just stunning.



Border waterways

Follow the Llangollen and Montgomery canals as they wander through Shropshire into Wales. Dare to walk across the 'stream in the sky' at Pontcysyllte Aqueduct and don't miss Llanrhaeadr Waterfall, higher than Niagara Falls. Then stroll around Ellesmere's beautiful meres or cycle around Lake Vyrnwy in Mid Wales.



Family days out

Do you want to feed a lamb at an award winning farm attraction or a take a trip on a heritage train? How about going on a safari? There's a larger than life metal safari which is unique! There's even a beach for one summer weekend. Sandcastle fun in the centre



Active borderlands

This is walking country! Enjoy exploring a quieter part of Shropshire and the Welsh Borders. Offa's Dyke Path wanders along the border with breath taking views over Shropshire and Wales. Canal towpaths beckon for a stroll or gentle bike ride or for more of a challenge, bring your mountain bike or your paddle board.

Tastes of Oswestry




